Temple Beth El Cantor's Message

No doubt, you have seen a movie or read a book that starts out in a particular fashion and then, part-way through, takes a sharp and unforeseen turn and becomes a different kind of work entirely. That sudden switch is more than just a story-telling device. It serves to keep you interested and more engaged with what comes next.

The Torah does much the same thing right about this point in the year. From Parshat B'rayshit to Yitro, which we read on the last Shabbat of January, the Torah is primarily a narrative, with a few *mitzvot* thrown in. There are only three *mitzvot* in the entire book of Genesis, and only 22 in the book of Exodus before Yitro (and of those 22, 17 relate to Passover). Up to that point, then, we come across only four percent of all of mitzvot. The fact is, we barely notice their absence, as we are easily caught up in the stories of the creation, the flood, Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, Rebeccah, Jacob, Leah, Rachel and their children, Moses and the story of the Exodus. These stories, in their flow, their subtlety and their deep knowledge of the human condition, have proved timeless over the millenia.

But here the Torah does a 180. With little warning, it changes to a book that is a book of laws, with some narrative thrown in. Yes, each of the last four books has at least one *parsha* with no *mitzvot*, but over 95 percent of the 613 *mitzvot*, the bedrock foundation upon which Jewish life is situated, are found in these books. These commandments cover all aspect of life, from whom to marry to how to conduct one's business, ritual to eating, child-raising, to rules of war.

Why the change? Especially since so many people do regard the Torah as a "storybook." Actually, the answer lies in Rashi's commentary on the first verse of Genesis. He quotes Rabbi Isaac saying that it does not seem necessary to start the Torah with the *(Continued on Page 3)*

creation; one might expect it to begin in Exodus with the first commandments given to the Israelites as a people. The reason, continues Rashi, is to make clear that God created the world, and can therefore give portions of it to whoever He sees fit. Otherwise, the Israelites' claim on the Promised Land would have no validity.

We can see, though, that the first 15 *parshiyot* of the Torah provide more than validation of a land claim; they give us context. It isn't enough (although you would think it should be) that God gave us these commandments at Sinai after personally delivering us from Egypt. We need to know why God spoke to us. Out of all the nations of the earth, how did we merit this special consideration?

By reading Genesis, we come to understand the history and nature of our relationship with God. This is not to say simply that Abraham and his descendants believed in one god and that was it. Others posited a belief in a god. Rather, it was the truly revolutionary notion that this God wanted us to behave in a particular way. Our God has expectations. It is this idea, as well as our continuing efforts to meet those expectations, that are the necessary precursor to the body of law that the Torah provides. From this point on, the Torah mostly tells us what and how. The part we read up until now tells us why.

When the Temple was completed I remember walking with my dad and sister Vye from Melrose and Sunset Avenues each Shabbat morning for services, as we made our way down Genesee Street other children would join us and Dad's bag of candy would happily be given out during the trip.

Uncle Joe Sonneborn was the new Temple's building chairman and the dedication of the corner stone was a wonderful celebration.

My mom, Jeanette Sonneborn was a president of Sisterhood; they sure worked hard as did all the other presidents. They put on Bazaars, and a Thanksgiving Dance for us. The Men's Club did minstrels and Vaudeville shows, anything to make money and have a little fun and a few laughs. My Uncle Joe went to Germany to the town of Breidenbauch, where he retrieved a Torah and donated it to the Temple. What a joyous time that was.

I remember President Herman E. Kowalsky had the happy job of raising funds, from the members and those in the armed forces to burn the mortgage.

All these things and more were an integral part of my religious training and life for which I thank Temple Beth El.
