Temple Beth El Cantor Message

Back in January, I was in a Zoom meeting for Educational Directors sponsored by USCJ on the topic of how to celebrate Purim in a pandemic. Many (most?) of those taking part were from synagogues that were much larger and therefore had greater resources than Temple Beth El. One of the main topics of discussion was how to distribute materials to families so that the children in the Hebrew School could properly participate in the associated crafting activities.

Things were a bit more nuts and bolts in our breakout session. There, one of the other people raised the topic of marking the anniversary of social isolation, noting that Purim last year was just a few days before social distancing and isolation dicta were imposed, so it was pretty much the last thing any of us did in groups in person.

I suggested that we might do better to associate the remembrance with Passover for a few reasons. Firstly, Purim is a truly happy, joyous holiday. Most people do not have such feelings related to the various COVID-19 protocols, and this would subtract from the celebrations of the day. Also, I see a real parallel to the first Passover in the desert, one vear after the exodus. The Israelites' condition was quite different than it had been a year ago, and they knew that there was still ground to cover before they got to their ultimate destination. Additionally, 2020 (or 5780, if you prefer) was a Passover such as none of us could remember. Many of us recall last year's seders as the first time we had an experience with Zoom (or Meetings, or Teams or whatever). It was a novel event and a very different way of recreating the exodus from Egypt.

Things being what they are, we are likely to be in a similar situation for Passover this year. After twelve months of socially isolating we feel the lack of our familiar modes of celebrating even more keenly. It is hard, and that hardship is evident in all of our lives.

One of the key sentences of the Haggadah states, "In every generation, each person is obligated to see themselves as though they, personally, had come forth from Egypt." This is a perennial challenge, particularly for those of us who have lived lives of freedom and relative ease. The generation of the Exodus was buffeted by the winds of change as perhaps no generation since; as is all too common, many of their tribulations were of their own making.

This year, perhaps to some small measure, we can better appreciate the mindset of that generation. We, too, are a year in to a situation none of us foresaw. We, too, remain somewhat disoriented and are constantly working to bring normality to our lives. We, too, understand that we can never really go back to where we were, and do not really know when we might get to our ultimate destination.

As we celebrate Passover, let us try to better realize both what freedom meant to that generation and to our own. Let us marvel at God's deliverance as our ancestors did millennia ago. Let us be able to say with a full heart, "This is on account of what God did for me when I came forth out of Egypt."

Temple Beth El President's Message

Did you ever think of the note you left at the Western Wall?

This article was taken from the Jerusalem Post but is still relevant today.

"Earlier this week at the Western Wall, the prayer notes many worshipers and travelers who make their way far and wide to place in the Wall were removed from the stones before the Pesach holiday began.

The Rabbi of the Western Wall Shmuel Rabinovitch led a team from the Western Wall Heritage Foundation to extract all the notes from the Wall as he does twice a year.

The staff of the Western Wall Heritage foundation began clearing the notes from the stones that had been buried in the wall from the past six months, and in the coming days they will be transferred to Genizah, a burial place for sacred religious texts on the Mount of Olives, where they will be buried together with the old holy books also being transferred at the same time.

In order to preserve the privacy and dignity of those who write the notes, the area was sealed until the collection was completed. All the notes were put in sealed sacks with close supervision of the employees to ensure the discretion. The prayer notes are each time removed by wooden sticks, as to not damage the sanctity of the stones.

During the morning, the stones were also inspected. The heritage foundation carries out a comprehensive examination of the stability of the Western Wall's stones twice a year, on the eve of Passover and Rosh Hashanah, including the Wilson's Arch and the Machkema Building. During the examination, the walls are cleaned from any excrement or loose stone and plaster.

At the conclusion of the work, Rabinovitch prayed for all those who wrote notes in order for their wishes to be fulfilled.

In the lower part of the wall, stone corrosion occurs. Conservationists have put a bonding material to strengthen the layers and stop the peeling in the past.

During the check last year a new technique was also tested— using ultrasound technology— to provide a picture of the inner structure of the stones without damaging it. Every year, twice a year, these notes are collected and buried to prepare for the holidays of Rosh Hoshana and Passover.

Millions of notes are sent by people from Israel and all over the world. Notes are sent through the website of the Western Wall, fax and mail.

"Over the past 12 years, since it went online, 672,210 notes have been sent through the Western Wall website," the statement read"The traditional Birkat Kohanim (Priestly Blessing) that will take place at the Western Wall Plaza on Monday, the 2nd day of Chol Hamoed," the statement concluded."




