Temple Beth El Cantor Message

A working definition of the term 'old joke' is one that you have heard before. So here is an old joke:

A man is caught in a massive flood and gets to the roof of his house. A neighbor floats by on a raft and offers him a ride to safety. "No," the man says, "I am waiting for God to save me." As the waters continue to rise, a rescue crew comes by and offers to take him in their boat. "No," he says, "I am waiting for God to save me." As the waters are starting to encompass the roof, a helicopter flies overhead and tries to get him. "No," he insists, "I am waiting for God to save me."

The man is swallowed by the flood waters and drowns. When he appears before the Throne of Judgement, he is distraught. "Lord," he says, "I don't understand. I truly believed in you. What happened?"

"I sent a raft, a boat and a helicopter," says God, "What on Earth were you waiting for?"

As I write this, a vaccine for COVID-19 has just begun to be administered. Recent surveys suggest that roughly 40% of Americans may choose not to get the Why would people refuse this vaccine. immunity opportunity to secure for themselves, as well as helping to choke off the spread of this deadly disease?

There are some who feel that the process was executed too quickly for proper safety protocols to have been followed. There are others who feel that the disease is basically a hoax that poses no threat to them personally. There are doubtless other reasons being offered.

Regardless of the reason, such a choice is at variance with mainstream Jewish thought. The overriding number of instances when I have spoken with or listened to Jews here and abroad, the focus has been resolute:

pikuach nefesh, preserving life. Restrictions on gathering in shul for prayer and other occasions, the relaxation of prohibitions against using electronics on Shabbat and Yom Tov in order to allow gathering online, these are ways that the rabbinate, applying halacha with concern for tradition and those who practice it, has worked to allow us to follow the mitzvot safely. Even if you feel that you, personally are not at risk, the possibility of spreading a disease to others is a clear violation of the Torah command stated in Leviticus 19:15, "Do not stand over the blood of your neighbor." As Rabbi Yitzchak Magriso observed in the 18th century commentary Me'am Lo'ez, this includes "...an injunction that if one sees his neighbor in danger and has the ability to do something, he must do everything in his power to help him."

That said, I have had, over the last months, to try to explain to people in the Jewish community as well as outside of it, why Haredi Jews insist on gathering for prayer and simchas in numbers and proximity that clearly put them at risk.

We can expect that there will continue to be those who resist and reject vaccination as an appropriate course of action, just as those who did the same to Moses' leadership as a manifestation of Divine providence (and thanks to Rabbi Schaktman for the analogy). God is providing us with ways to get off of this roof. Will we accept them in thanks, or will we insist that the flood waters aren't really that dangerous?

MEMORIAL BOARDS


